When is an "Audit" a good thing?

Who does the talking in a legal audit?

The word audit comes from the Latin word audire, meaning "to hear" — hopefully, something at which your attorney is skilled. Sitting down with your lawyer for an hour or so allows them to listen and understand your situation and needs. The time spent with your attorney talking about your circumstances can be one of the most productive hours you will spend all year.

What can you talk about during a legal audit?

It is about listening and your questions: what problems or issues are developing that you "just haven't had time to sit down and talk about" yet? Is there a key employee you want to retain or a potential new investor you've been talking to? Is there a landlord issue that is becoming a problem? Are there problems with a vendor that just won't go away? Perhaps there is an account becoming more of a problem? How about that employee handbook you've meant to get going on but haven't quite started? What has happened during the past year, good and bad, that you can learn from? What can you do to make your business more accessible and productive in the coming years?

You know best what is troubling you and why. Your issues may be large or small, and perhaps you have no problems at all. But giving your lawyer a chance just to listen to you at least once a year with no specific agenda is a great way to integrate the

strength of your legal adviser into your business.

It is so valuable, it practically pays for itself.
